I. CALL TO ORDER, PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE, ROLL CALL

Board Chair Jesse Claypool called the meeting to order at 5:31 pm, pledge of allegiance was done and quorum was noted. Board Member Laurie Tippin was absent.

II. APPROVAL OF AGENDA

Board Member Wayne Langston made a motion to approve the agenda, Board Member Will Johnson seconded and the motion passed. All.

III. PUBLIC COMMENT

B. Approval of April/May 2018 Treasurer's Report.

BM Langston made a motion to approve the consent items, Board Member Dave Schroeder seconded and the motion passed. All.

V. REPORTS

A. District Manager Report – Sims.

District Manager Ian Sims presented his report. He has advertised the Project Coordinator position in the Lassen County Times, on KSUE, the Sierra Daily News and has sent a position description to the RCD/WM stakeholders. To date he has not received any responses. BM Johnson asked if the position has been advertised anywhere other than locally and DM Sims said it had not but that he planned to run an ad in Craigslist and Indeed.

DM Sims also said this has been a busy irrigation season with various delivery issues, including users tampering with diversions. Another issue mentioned was the question of who is the final arbitrator on watermaster issues. BM Langston said that both DM Sims and Watermaster Mitch Otto are doing a great job.

B. Correspondence – Wheeler.

Executive Secretary Merry Wheeler stated four letters of support for the Diamond Mountain Watershed Restoration Project(s) had been prepared for the Lassen County Fire Safe Council at the request of Tom Esgate. Also included in "Correspondence" was CARCD Invoice #411 in the amount of \$300 for the annual membership renewal premium. BC Claypool asked that copies be made and distributed to all Board members.

C. NRCS Agency Report – Peitz.

District Conservationist Eric Peitz presented his report. He mentioned that Farm Bill Assistant Christy Smith would be leaving at the end of June. He also noted that Rangeland Management Specialist Heidi Ramsey began her Acting District Conservationist role at the Elk Grove NRCS office on 5/14/18 and will serve a minimum of 60 days. He also said that evaluations are underway for five CSP Program applications for 2018. The next Modoc Regional RCD meeting is tentatively scheduled for October 2018.

D. Lassen SWAT – Tippin/Sims.

DM Sims noted there is a legislative push to refund Weed Management Areas (WMAs).

E. Buffalo Skedaddle-Sage Grouse Working Group – Schroeder.

BM Schroeder attended the last meeting and stated the group has been treading water for quite some time.

F. WAC Report – Langston.

BM Langston did not attend the 5/10/18 meeting. He stated there were some preliminary complaints but nothing has been formally turned in. BM Langston again praised DM Sims and WM Otto for the excellent jobs they're doing. WM Otto is working on updating control cards now that the tax list has been received from the assessor's office.

G. Modoc Regional RCD/CARCD Report – Tippin.

Board Member Laurie Tippin was not in attendance at the RCD meeting.

H. Fire Safe Council Report – Johnson.

BM Johnson said the LCFSC has many irons in the fire and is currently very active. He said they were very appreciative of the letters of support the HLVRCD prepared for them.

BM Johnson said that Lassen Land and Trails Trust (LLTT) would like the HLVRCD's thoughts on the Modoc Trail Line, which is an 80 mile long railroad easement that has three segments and would be multi-use. DM Sims said that LLTT has discussed the Modoc Trail Line with BLM and that if those talks fail the HLVRCD might have some interest in it.

BC Claypool spoke about carbon farming. He is considering a possible day meeting on 6/27/18 that would include a Fibershed-CCI presentation, which would be followed with a visit to Hulsman Ranch on 6/28/18. He also spoke about a soils testing kit which provides a soil quality evaluation/site description. The Carbon Farm Plan Template could be a possible fee for service plan for the HLVRCD.





The proposed project area is behind the Susanville Railroad Depot Visitor Center in Susanville, CA. This 7.11 property is located through a "Cut" on the former Lassen-Fernley rail line constructed by Southern Pacific Railroad from Fernley, Nevada to Westwood, California between 1912 to 1914. It is flanked by steep side slopes where material was excavated to lay the tracks. The former rail line heading west from the Depot to Westwood is now the 26-mile Bizz Johnson National Recreation Trail, managed by both the Bureau of Land Management and U.S. Forest Service. The 2015 *Historic Susanville Railroad Depot Visitor Center and Trailhead Concept Plan* for the property calls for the "Bizz" to be extended along the old railroad corridor in the future. This new trail segment will then link with the proposed Wendel Line Rail Trail at Alexander Avenue.

This is a two-phase restoration project to plan and then implement the stabilization of 20 OHV recreational hill climbs on 4 acres behind the Depot and to close the area to OHVs (see attached Exhibits 1-4). Phase 1 includes the completion of: 1) a site design plan with recommended restoration techniques and site-specific specifications; 2) a monitoring plan; and 3) CEQA. These documents will be prepared by LLTT partners and the City of Susanville. Phase 1 will be completed by 2017.

Phase 2 will implement the site design plan to: 1) re-contour bare hill climbs that flank either side of the flat railroad grade with use of a dozer, bobcat, excavator, dump truck and grader; 2) direct water runoff from the slopes toward a "direct inlet" culvert at Alexander Avenue using a shallow trench at the base of both slopes; 3) hydro-seed the slopes with native plants; 4) lay landscape fabric and straw waddles to minimize erosion until the bare ground has revegetated; 5) grade the center of the "Cut" to remove vehicle tracks and pot holes, and direct water flow to the east; 6) fence the perimeter of the property and install bollards to prevent future OHV trespass; 7) install signs to inform the public this is a non-motorized area; and 8) monitor the success of restoration activities. Phase 2 will be completed in 2017-2018.

Background: To further its trails mission, LLTT acquired 7.11 acres of private property directly east of the LLTT-owned Depot in 2015 to provide a shared use, non-motorized trail and community green space in the center of town. This purchase will extend the 26-mile Bizz Johnson National Recreation Trail with the proposed 23 mile Wendel Line Rail Trail, which will then connect to the existing 85.5 mile Modoc Line Rail Trail in eastern Lassen and Modoc Counties.

The *Concept Plan* for the depot property was completed in September 2015 to provide a blueprint to guide the restoration, development, and management of the area over the next 20 years in keeping with LLTT's mission. It identifies the overall goals and proposed actions that will enhance the property for public use while minimizing impacts on the site's natural resources. Community engagement was a key component in the preparation of the plan as LLTT considered various management options. This restoration project is consistent with the *Concept Plan*.

The *Concept Plan* and this project are also consistent with the *Susanville General Plan (1991)*, *Lassen County General Plan (2000)*, *Lassen County Bikeway Master Plan (2011 update)*, *Lassen County Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy (2012)*, and is listed in the county's 2012 *Regional Transportation Plan*.

The proposed project area is behind the Susanville Railroad Depot Visitor Center in Susanville, CA. This 7.11 property is located through a "Cut" on the former Lassen-Fernley rail line constructed by Southern Pacific Railroad from Fernley, Nevada to Westwood, California between 1912 to 1914. It is flanked by steep side slopes where material was excavated to lay the tracks. The former rail line heading west from the Depot to Westwood is now the 26-mile Bizz Johnson National Recreation Trail, managed by both the Bureau of Land Management and U.S. Forest Service. The 2015 *Historic Susanville Railroad Depot Visitor Center and Trailhead Concept Plan* for the property calls for the "Bizz" to be extended along the old railroad corridor in the future. This new trail segment will then link with the proposed Wendel Line Rail Trail at Alexander Avenue.

This is a two phase restoration project to plan and then implement the stabilization of 20 OHV recreational hill climbs on 4 acres behind the Depot and to close the area to OHVs (see attached Exhibits 1-4). Phase 1 includes the completion of: 1) a site design plan with recommended restoration techniques and site specific specifications; 2) a monitoring plan; and 3) CEQA. These documents will be prepared by LLTT partners and the City of Susanville. Phase 1 will be completed by 2017.

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Background: To further its trails mission, LLTT acquired 7.11 acres of private property directly east of the LLTT-owned Depot in 2015 to provide a shared-use, non-motorized trail and community green space in the center of town. This purchase will extend the 26 mile Bizz Johnson National Recreation Trail with the proposed 23 mile Wendel Line Rail Trail, which will then connect to the existing 85.5 mile Modoc Line Rail Trail in eastern Lassen and Modoc Counties.

The *Concept Plan* for the depot property was completed in September 2015 to provide a blueprint to guide the restoration, development, and management of the area over the next 20 years in keeping with LLTT's mission. It identifies the overall goals and proposed actions that will enhance the property for public use while minimizing impacts on the site's natural resources. Community engagement was a key component in the preparation of the plan as LLTT considered various management options. This restoration project is consistent with the *Concept Plan*.

The *Concept Plan* and this project are also consistent with the *Susanville General Plan* (1991), *Lassen County General Plan* (2000), *Lassen County Bikeway Master Plan* (2011 update), *Lassen County Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy* (2012), and is listed in the county's 2012 *Regional Transportation Plan*.

B. Describe how the proposed Project relates to OHV Recreation and how OHV Recreation caused the damage:

Acquisition of the 7.11 acre parcel east of the depot was first identified by community stakeholders and recreational user groups in the late 1980s when LLTT purchased and restored the Susanville Railroad Depot. Because the private landowner lived out-of-town, there was minimal oversight of the vacant property for many years. Over time, motor vehicles (trucks, ATVs and dirt bikes) powered up both cut banks for hill climbs, leaving incised tracks on the steep slopes in 20 different locations (Exhibits 2-4). The lack of vegetation triggered the formation of gullies due to erosion from rain water/snow and wind. This proposed project will effectively close and rehabilitate 4 acres illegally used for recreational hill

climbs to reduce or prevent further soil loss. The entire 7.11 acre property will also be fenced and signed to restrict OHV trespass. (Note: there other disturbed areas along the cut banks primarily due to deer paths or user-created bicycle tracks. These paths are not shown on the maps or included in the project.)

C. Describe the size of the specific Project Area(s) in acres and/or miles

The size of the hill climb area that will be restored is 4 acres. The fenced area is 7.11 acres.

D. Monitoring and Methodology

The site monitoring plan will be developed during the planning and design phase for this project. It will include 1) implementation monitoring to determine if site restoration techniques were accomplished as intended; 2) effectiveness monitoring to determine if restoration activities successfully met our objectives; and 3) trend monitoring to document site change over time with photos.

F. Goals, Objectives and Methodology / Peer Reviews

This project does not involve scientific or cultural studies. The site design plan will describe proposed restoration activities. This plan will be a collaborative effort by several subject matter experts – a civil engineer, botanist, wildlife biologist, soil scientist, and recreation planner.

G. Plan for Protection of Restored Area

The proposed project includes the removal of the existing fence around the perimeter of the property due to disrepair. A new, higher fence will be installed. A partial fence and three collapsible bollards will block OHV access at the east end of the property along Alexander Avenue. Two collapsible bollards will block access from the west end.

Media announcements will publicize the project before, during and after it is completed to foster public support for the change in use to a non-motorized area.

LLTT staff, LLTT volunteers, and the newly created Neighborhood Watch volunteer program will patrol the property at least weekly. LLTT staff are on site at their Depot office 5 days/week. City of Susanville Police Officers also regularly patrol the area after hours.

H. Soil Control Efforts

Off-site resource values will not be affected by this project. Bare slopes will be hydro-seeded and covered with landscape fabric. Straw wattles will staked at two locations along each hill climb to catch sediment. The center of the Cut will be graded and compacted to direct water flow to shallow drainage ditches at the base of each cut bank.

Public engagement leading to the adoption of the Historic Susanville Railroad Depot Visitor Center and Trailhead Concept Plan (2015) was extensive. In April 2015, LLTT conducted a public survey to gather comments for developing the property. 106 people completed the survey. On April 24-25, 2015, the National Park Service and LLTT hosted a Design Charrette to solicit public input on conceptual site drawings. Key stakeholders and neighbors attended the meeting including the BLM, Lassen County, and City of Susanville. Attendees supported restoration of OHV hill climbs on the cut banks and management of the area for non-motorized recreation. Many were concerned about LLTT's ability to take control of the property after years of neglect and illegal OHV use, garbage dumping, and vandalism. All of these activities have depreciated the neighborhood and shaken the residents' sense of security. Stakeholders wanted OHV-impacted areas restored and the property fenced and signed to prevent future OHV trespass.

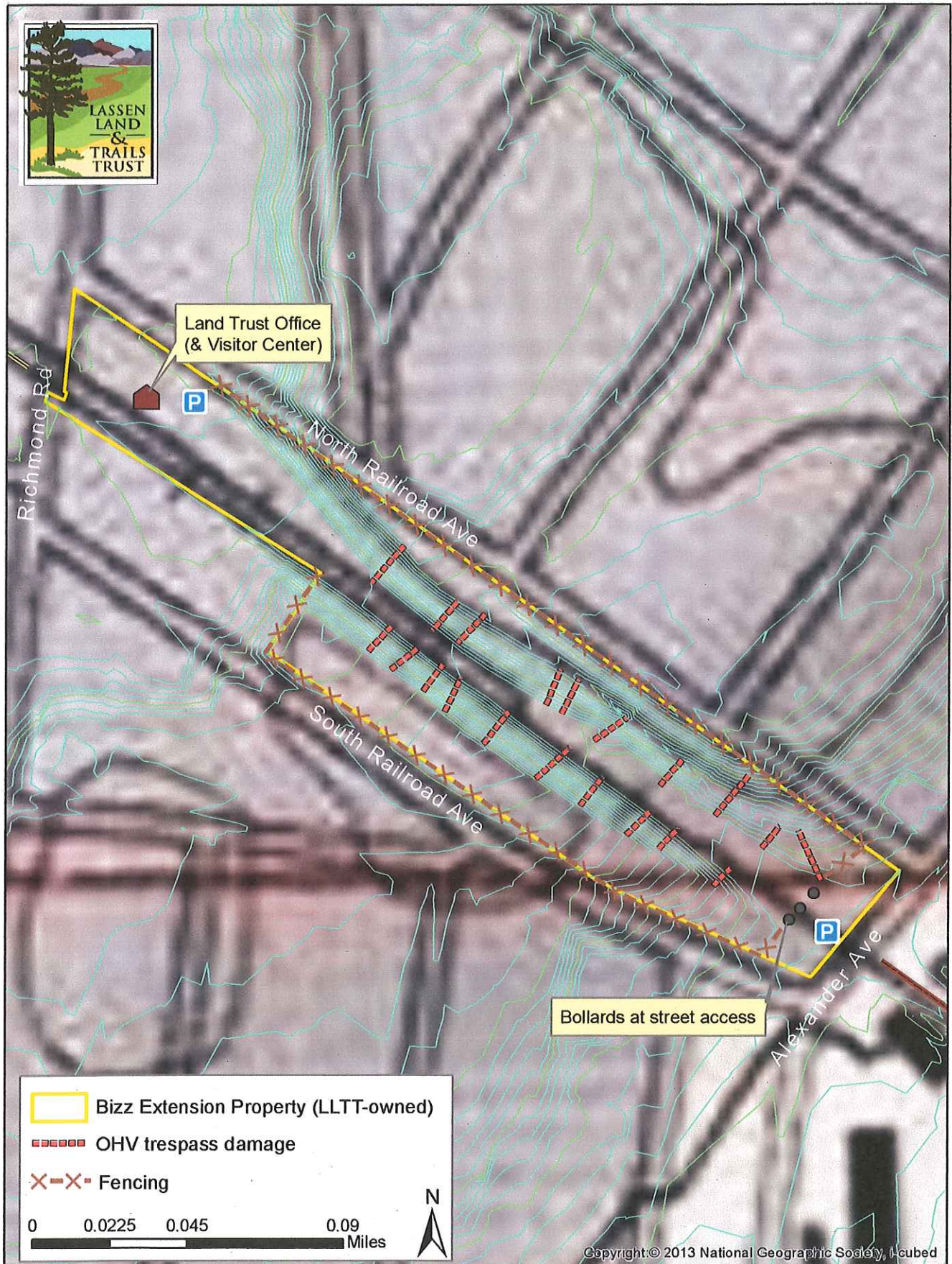

The Honey Lake Valley Resource Conservation District (HLVRCD) is pleased to offer this letter of support for the Lassen Land and Trails Trust (LLTT) application to the National Park Service's Rivers, Trails and Conservation Assistance (RTCA) Program. LLTT is seeking technical assistance to prepare a feasibility study and conceptual land use plan to assess community's managerial and financial capacity to acquire two significant properties currently for sale (a 23-mile abandoned railroad and a former mill site along the Susan River). Both properties are adjacent to State Route 36, the southern gateway into Susanville.

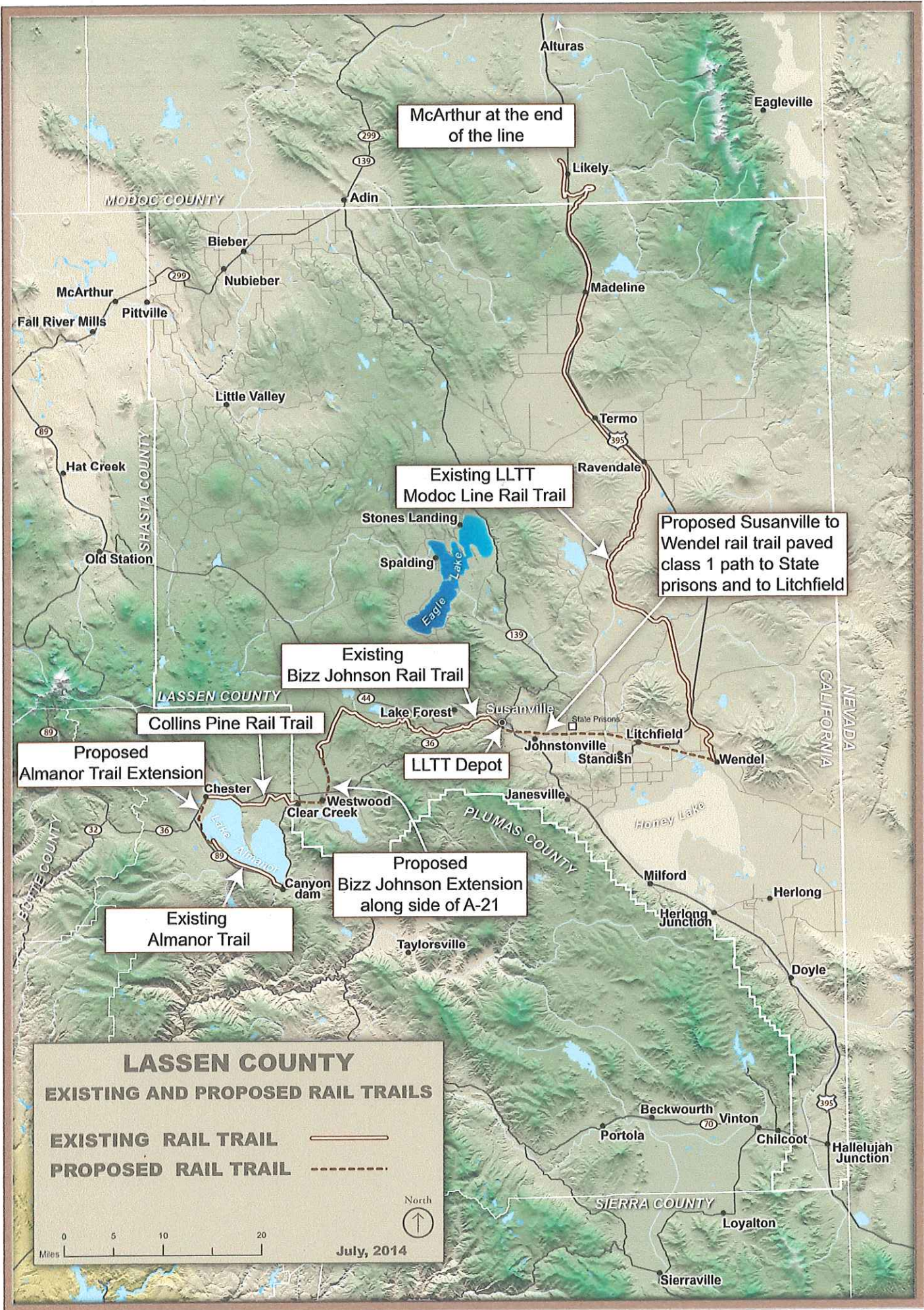
Acquisition of the 23-mile "Wendel Line" segment of the old Fernley and Lassen Railroad has long been identified as a high value transportation corridor. Acquisition of this segment from Union Pacific Railroad (a willing seller) would complete the final link between the 26-mile Bizz Johnson National Recreation Trail in Susanville with the 86-mile Modoc Line Rail Trail to create a continuous 135-mile rail trail. The former mill site includes an 81-acre parcel now offered for sale by Sierra Pacific Industries. This parcel is bordered by the Susanville River in the north and the Wendel Line in the south. It has the potential to be developed as a local park with trails, a natural area along the river, and even a commercial district.

We share LLTT's and Lassen County's vision to complete a regional network of trails and green space consistent with several higher-level county and city management plans. Public engagement is critical as we move forward with implementing next steps in the acquisition process. As you know, RTCA assisted LLTT with a similar conceptual land use plan. The proposed developments were subsequently funded and will be implemented this year thanks to the RTCA Program. For this new proposal, we will partner with LLTT to co-host community workshops, prepare maps and meeting materials, draft the feasibility study and land use plan, and help prepare the acquisition strategy. RTCA staff will be invaluable in facilitating these efforts.

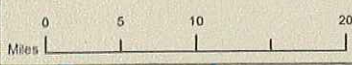

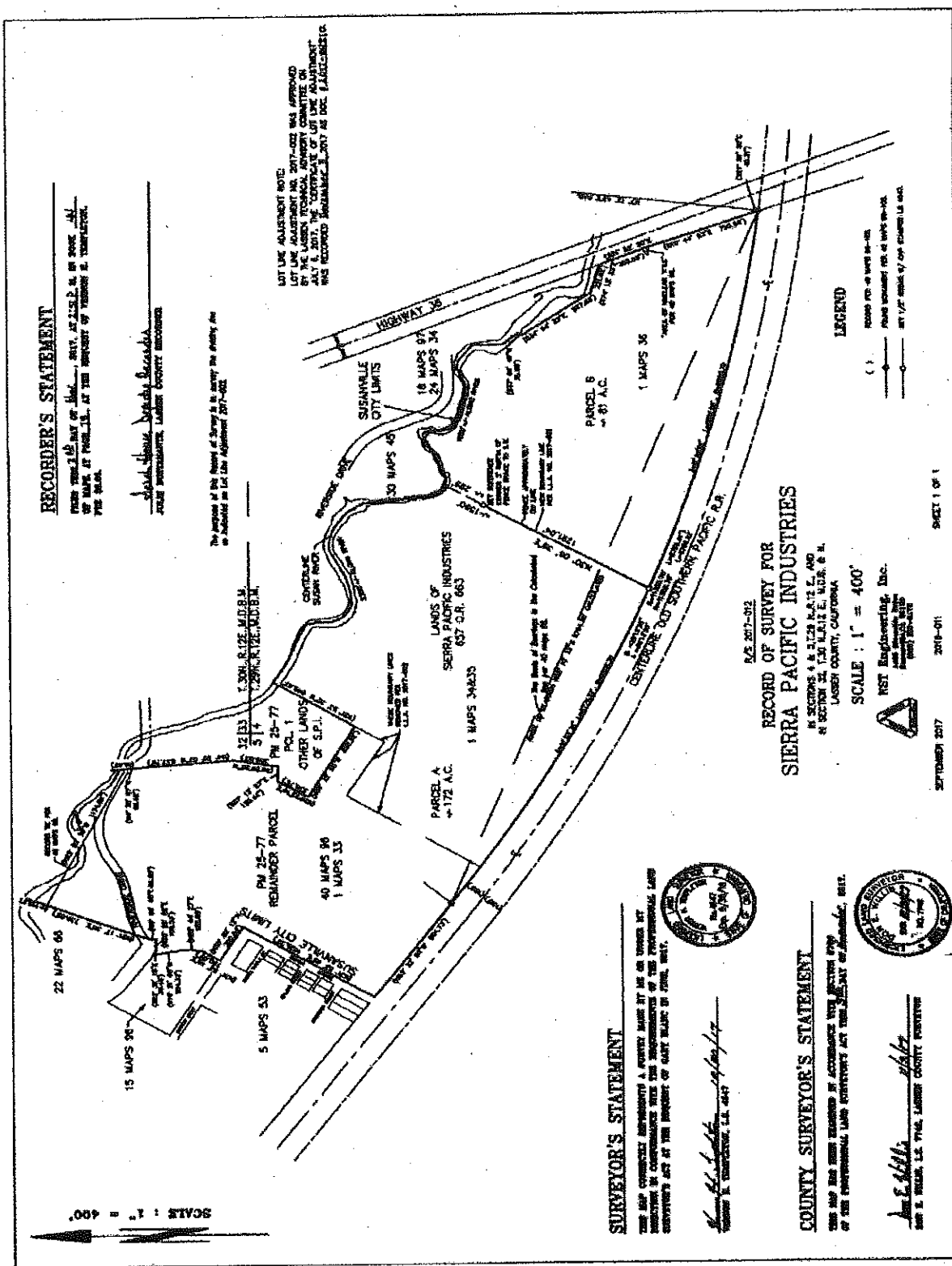

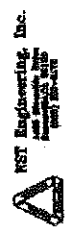

81-acre SPI Mill Property for Sale in Susanville, CA

The SPI mill site is a place where we can celebrate its past, enjoy the present, and embrace the community's future. This site could become a focal point for Susanville, similar to the continuing redevelopment of the Spokane's Riverfront Park.

Recommendation: Engage community stakeholders in planning for the future redevelopment of this 81-acre parcel. Seek consensus on a preferred vision to establish the framework for development.

Purpose: Identify a mix of land uses beneficial to the city and county such as open space, pathways, commercial development, and restoration of the river and adjacent riparian area, etc.

Potential Outcomes: Prepare a Conceptual Land Use Plan with alternative scenarios to guide proposed development. Draw bubble diagrams to display areas for commercial development, transportation corridors, and open space. Commercial areas should be designed so their scale and appearance are compatible with the character of the adjacent residential area and existing traffic patterns. Open space areas are set aside for socialization, outdoor recreation, public events, interpretation/education, and conservation. Development options for open areas include parks, greenways, playing fields, establishment of trees/native plants, restoration of the Susan River and riparian habitat (Susanville's most significant natural asset). Transportation corridors include vehicle access, the abandoned rail line to Wendel, a promenade along the river and a pedestrian bridge to cross it. Acquisition of the property would also facilitate construction of the county's planned extension of Skyline Drive to Richmond Road. The 81-acre parcel is listed for \$995,000.

Why Important: We have an opportunity to provide multiple benefits to our town that will stimulate economic growth, create a more livable, vibrant community, beautify the neighborhood, attract new residents, and enhance ecosystem health. We also have an opportunity to preserve the history of various mill operations at the site, which were so influential to Susanville's growth. Although some of the mill site could be designated for commercial development, it should not come at the expense of uptown Susanville by increasing the inventory of buildings for sale or vacant, obsolete structures.

Wendel Line from Susanville to the Modoc Line Rail Trail in Wendel

Background: The Wendel Line is an abandoned railway running east from the Bizz Johnston National Recreation Trail and Historic Susanville Railroad Depot, approximately 22.65 miles to connect with the 80-mile Modoc Line in Wendel, California. The corridor was abandoned in 1985 and is still owned by Union Pacific Railroad (UP), a willing seller. Title to the property is mostly (96%) non-reversionary. However, there are several parcels that are Act of Congress that UP would be unable to sell, but would instead "disclaim" those parcels. The right-of-way about 480 acres; wider segments are located at rail stations. UP valuation maps are available.

UP completed an appraisal five years ago. The various segments vary from range land, to agriculture, to rural residential, and averaged out at about \$1,500 per acre for the 480 acre +/- corridor, which equates to \$720,000. UP's Realty Specialist estimates the market value today would be around \$800,000. The assessed value of the Line from the California State Board of Equalization is \$889,512. The 86-mile Modoc Line (2,087 acres) was appraised at approximately \$800,000. UP sold it at a discount price for \$400,000 to the Lassen Land and Trails Trust in September 2008.

Statement of Benefits: The Wendel Line travels through the western edge of the Great Basin past small rail side communities, working ranch landscapes, unique geologic formations, and zig-zags along a myriad of sloughs and wetlands.

Multiple local and federal agency plans describe the collective vision of a seamless urban and regional multi-modal transportation system in Lassen, Modoc and Plumas Counties. The Wendel Line will help the local trails coalition achieve its regional trail objectives in the organization's mission statement and Strategic Plan ". . . to promote and enhance a public trail system throughout Lassen County." The project is also consistent with the goals in several other higher-level plans including the *Lassen County Regional Transportation Plan*, the *2011 Lassen County Bikeway Master Plan*, and the *2012 Lassen County Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy*. Upon completion, this visionary trail network will eventually connect to the existing 86-mile Modoc Line rail trail in eastern Lassen County (Trail Link ID: 6217543). To the west, the Bizz Johnson National Recreation Trail (ID: 6015215) will eventually link the communities of Westwood and Clear Creek Junction to the existing 13-mile Almanor Rail Trail to Chester (ID: 9825460) and then to the existing 9.5-mile Lake Almanor Recreation Trail along the west shore to Canyon Dam (ID: 6513005). This planned network will become one of the longest, interconnected rail trails in the U.S. (185 miles) as it winds its way through the geographic provinces of the southern Cascades, Sierra Nevada, Modoc Plateau and Great Basin. As a destination attraction, this transportation corridor will enhance the economic, environmental, and social vitality of the region just as the railroad did long ago. Acquisition of the Wendel Line is integral to realizing this trails vision (refer to the attached maps). The proposed long-term landowner of the corridor is Lassen County, although the Board of Supervisors has not officially approved this.

WHEREAS, The HLVRCD has adopted Rules and Regulations for the administration of the Watermaster Service; and

WHEREAS, Article V. of the Rules and Regulations sets forth the Watermaster's rules and procedures for adopting an annual budget and apportioning the budgeted amount among the applicable water right holders within the Service Area; and

WHEREAS, Section 5.6 of Article V. of the Rules and Regulations states that the Watermaster Board shall, on or before August 15th of each year, certify to the Lassen County Auditor and the Lassen County Board of Supervisors the amount required in order to pay the apportionment for the ensuing fiscal year, to be levied on the land used in storage or diversion, conveyance or distribution of water stored or diverted under the right and the land on which the water is, or is entitled to be, used;

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Board of Directors of the Honey Lake Valley Resource Conservation District adopts the attached FY 2018/2019 Susan River Service Area apportionment and authorizes the HLVRCD Board Chairman to certify this apportionment to the Lassen County Auditor and Board of Supervisors.
